VICAR'S REPORT

The danger with 2011 is that it could be just the year before 2012 (you know what I mean). I hope that we managed to do a bit more than that, but there was certainly a focus on preparation for 2012. The **Ultimate Dream** long-weekend Mission was a further part of the preparation for 2012, and helped us to improve our skills as churches. Some of the experience gained helped to improve our open Air services and our outreach ministry generally. Other 2012 preparation included some hard planning, a budget and some fundraising for the Ultimate Gold Olympic Mission. This bore fruit in the form of a £20,000 grant from the Chelmsford Diocese Mission Opportunity Fund.

2011 was a difficult year, with 2 of our 3 clergy in Africa almost all year; this was the first time in 20 years that we have been without a Curate or Associate Minister. I am deeply grateful to all of our Ministry team for their extra hard work, and especially to Sheva and Iris for covering so many Tuesdays. It was a great relief to welcome Peter Ngugi back in December, and also to welcome Rev. Peter Kinyanjui as Associate Minister. (As someone commented, we prayed for Peter and got 2 - God's double blessing). Peter K. is an experienced priest, and is with us to help him gain experience of the Church of England, with the expectation that he will one day become a Parish Priest in the C of E. Canon Peter Kolawole remains in Nigeria, but we hope he will return one day.

An important challenge for 2011 was the opening of the **inSpiration** Prayer Room at Westfield. This was the result of much planning, praying and a lot of meetings; many people, including Carol, worked hard to make this possible, and now many more people, including a large number from St John's are working to staff the room 7 days a week. Robert Otule, our trainee Reader also goes down in history as the minister who led the first-ever Christian service at inSpiration on Sunday 18th September. Since then a number of other Churches have joined in leading services, with St John's covering the 4th and 5th Sunday mornings. I have chaired inSpire, the trust which manages the Prayer Room, since April, and I am very thankful that St. John's has supported this important ministry.

A new challenge for me in 2011 was my appointment as Met Police Chaplain for Stratford; I have always tried to offer pastoral support to our local Police officers, so could not really refuse. I have continued as a Governor at Carpenters School and was re-appointed for a further term in August.

St John's continues to host many visits by classes of children from local schools. We are able to provide an action-packed 45 minute guided tour, which the children find very interesting. This is a unique opportunity to tell the children about Jesus and his Church without the charge of engaging in overt evangelism.

It was good to welcome the London Acholi Christian Fellowship back to St. John's. This is not another group hiring the church, but part of our ministry; we hope to share leadership of the monthly service between the 3 clergy, and I am encouraging the group to lead as much of the service as possible. We have also continued to support the Newham Scouts, hosting the annual Nativity play and Carols service; we will, again, host the St George's Day Service in 2012.

I am always aware of your prayer and care for me: at a recent ministry review with the Bishop of Barking he commented on my positive attitude to ministry; this says a great deal for the way in which we are partners in the ministry and mission to which Jesus has called us all. Thank you for your fellowship during 2011; by God's grace we will survive 2012 and serve the Lord together.

- The new venture in January 2011 was the nightshelter organised by Stratford churches. A large number of St. John's members assisted with the project.
- The Women's Group organised a trip to the pantomime oh yes they did!
- At the end of January Chizoma Mbataku graduated as a Christian youth leader.
- On the first weekend in February we were joined, once again, by Through Faith Missions for a training course. 14 members of St. John's are now TFM evangelists and 4 people joined the TFM Walk West Dorset mission at the end of September.
- There were several lunches arranged after the Sunday morning service during 2011, some by the TNT Fellowship Group and some by the Women's Group.
- Sporty church members competed in a Table Tennis tournament in February.

- Several different Church groups planned and led the Sunday Morning Service during the year the Women's Group on Mothering Sunday, the Men's Group on Father's Day, and the YPF Group took the Morning Service on 8th May.
- On 29th April we watched the Royal Wedding on the large screen at Highway Church.
- There was a great variety of music at the Summer Wednesday Lunchtime Concerts.
- There was a good turnout for an event called "Redeeming Our Communities" at Woodgrange Baptist Church in May, when the police, local Councillors and local churches discussed ways of working together for the good of the community.
- The Men's Group had a special event in May with a focus on Pakistan and a speaker from the British Pakistani Christian Association.
- It rained on Pentecost Sunday in June, so the picnic didn't happen, but there was a service of prayer and praise at Highway Church for all the Stratford Churches.
- Pete Saunders from NAPAC spoke at a special "Church on Wednesday" in June
- The Bishop of Northern Uganda joined us on 3rd July for a special Evening Service with the Acholi Fellowship.
- "The Ultimate Dream" in July was a dress rehearsal to help us with our planning for outreach during the 2012 Olympic & Paralympic Games. On Saturday afternoon there was an excellent "Stratford Churches have got Talent" showcase event.
- Two Church members passed away in July: Birlton Mitchell and "Big" Charles Thomas. We miss them both.
- In the summer the Women's Group organised a Summer Fete and the Men's Group organised a family walk in Wanstead Park.
- Some Sunday Club children went to the Longbarn Camp in Kent and some of the YPF Group went to the CYFA Camp in Devon.
- Shirley Lacey organised a coach trip to Clacton in August.
- There was a Choir Photo in September just before Anna Morgan went to college.
- Westfield Stratford City opened in September along with the rest & faith space staffed by volunteers from churches in the area.
- There was scaffolding outside in September when a high parapet had to be rebuilt.
- The organ was out of action in October as it needed essential maintenance work.
- The big event of October was the "One World" event, organised by Sheva Williams. There was also a Saints' Party for children on the same day.
- We all rejoiced when Rev Peter Ngugi was ordained priest in Kenya in October, married Belinda in Australia in November and returned to St. John's in December.

THROUGH THE WEEK AT ST JOHN'S

SUNDAYS are an important day. Some people think that Sunday Church attendance is declining; not at St John's!

THE MORNING SERVICE is an occasion for a lot of different activities, much more than just a service. It is a springboard for worship, teaching, prayer, fellowship, baptisms and an increasing number of after-service groups and meetings. Our worship pattern of alternating Holy Communion and Prayer/Praise Services continues, with a consistent emphasis on praise through music. This service also becomes an Open Air evangelistic event during July and August, showing passers-by a vibrant church at worship and prayer. Attendance continues to grow slowly, with average attendance during 2011 of 342, an increase over 2010.

A very large number of people help to make this service happen, and we need to recognise their hard work and commitment to ministry.

THE EVENING SERVICE continues to be a smaller, quieter service, with a high proportion of people who "drop in", sometimes for only part of the service. Smaller numbers and fewer children allow more time for silence and reflection.

Robert Otule joined the leadership team for this service during 2011, and his sensitive leading and thoughtful preaching have been much appreciated. Cheryl Ramballi and Elis Matthews have also contributed greatly to leading this service

Average attendance during 2011 was 68 people, a small increase over 2010. The service also served as a base for some united Stratford Churches services, a welcome service for the new Bishop of Northern Uganda, our annual Confirmation in November and the Carols by Candlelight at Christmas.

THE CHOIR AND MUSIC GROUP

2011 has seen significant change in personnel within the Choir and Music Groups. In the early summer, Richard Aubrey, a regular worship leader and 'you name it-I can play it' member of the group, was invited to become temporary music director at St. John's Church, Hackney. The post became permanent in the autumn. Whilst it is sad to see members move on, it is surely part of our ministry at St John's, Stratford to develop skills and gifts in each other so that we can move on as God leads us. We wish him

well in his new post and look to our Father to lead other musicians to the church to swell our ranks. For a few months, we had the pleasure of sharing our practice and worship times with Julia, an Australian violinist, temporarily based in Stratford. In October, the Organ was taken out of action for a couple of weeks while it underwent a vital overhaul, the first major work carried out for many years. Following the necessary treatment, the organ sounds as magnificent as ever, especially in the most capable hands of our organist, Geoff Hobbs.

The Choir has moved forward in many ways in the past year. For many years this report has closed by inviting men and young people in particular to listen for god's call to join us and to respond. Well, this year, they have, praise god! We have seen a growing number sitting on the organ side (where the men sit!) and four new voung people have joined - three of them male. We are always open to welcome more newcomers and this year it would be particularly pleasing to welcome any altos who feel the call. With growing numbers and the continuing commitment of those who have served the Lord and the congregation faithfully over the years, we are still making progress, always seeking to develop our musical skills to the full, to use the gifts we have been given in the best way we can.

PRAYER MINISTRY continues as usual during Sunday morning and evening services in the Prayer Chapel. We had 2 very successful meetings during the summer for discussion and refreshing; a total of 28 members attended, gratitude was expressed with a desire for more regular meetings. The willingness shown by all shows that we love the way that God is using us, and that it is our desire to continue working in 2012 and beyond to fulfil his kingdom here on earth for his glory and pleasure.

During the year 26 adults have been leaders or assistants for the various Sunday Club groups – thank you everyone.

We use the Scripture Union "Light" syllabus. During the year the children covered the following topics:

January – God protects David in his early life February – The story of Jonah

March – Jesus' parables challenge us about how we should live

April – God's plan for our salvation (Easter)

May - King David

June - The gift of God's Spirit

July - Solomon

September – Elijah the prophet

October – Jesus, the friend

November - Elisha the prophet

December – Good and faithful God (Christmas)

This year, instead of Easter Eggs, we were healthy and thought of others and we bought some chickens for a development project at an Anglican mission school in central Zambia. The younger children still received "He is Risen" balloons. In April Sunday Club celebrated its 21st Birthday.

Some of the older children attended the Scripture union Longbarn Camp in Kent in August. Once again, Sheva Williams organised a successful Saints' Party at the end of October. In November

7 members of Sunday Club (+ 5 members of YPF) were confirmed. Thanks to Frances Aubrey for leading the Confirmation classes. Christmas is always a busy time and children made the large church Christmas card and also took part in a Nativity tableau. All the children who attended over the Christmas season were given a present from St. John's.

WELCOMERS

In 1652 the famous Puritan poet John Milton (later author of "Paradise Lost") became blind. This caused him great personal grief as he was concerned how he could continue serving god. So, soon after the lost of his sight, he wrote a beautiful sonnet "On His Blindness", where he asked if the fact that "My light is spent" would make him "useless" to God. His response was that "God doth not need either man's work or his own gifts" and ended the poem with the famous words "They also serve who only stand and wait"

Christ told His parables about "Talents", St Paul wrote at length on "gifts"; certainly the successful message from St John's Church is a result of the spiritual gifts of the leadership, the praise skills of the choir and the musicians, the artistic skills of those many people who first built and now maintain the structure of the building, the administrative skills of those who run the church on a day-to-basis and service the community and maintain the financial stability of our church - submit that Milton's words might also apply to the

many (and there are lots of them) members of the Welcomers group at St John's.

We must always keep in mind, in an area where congregations are not the same week after week. where arrival times are not all the same, where the numbers of new and foreign visitors are increasing (and will increase even more this summer), that for many people the first impression they receive of St John's (and thus of Christianity) are those people "waiting" by the doors to welcome them, to greet them, to direct them, to disperse service papers, to provide information (not forgetting the unsung heroes, the car-park organisers]) This IS a gift, and I remain grateful and impressed at the caring manner with which my colleagues in the Welcomers Team "serve him best" (Milton again). The issue of "gifts" may scare some people, or make them feel inadequate: no, everyone in his or her own way, young and old, can and does contribute to the mission at St John's.

EVANGELISM AT ST. JOHN'S is

overseen directly by PCC. This ensures that Evangelism is at the heart of all PCC decisions.

The highlight of 2011 was the "Ultimate Dream " festival in July - a "long weekend" event, in partnership with Through Faith Missions and Open Air Campaigners, again involving 18 Stratford Churches. The aim again was to prepare for 2012, and there was a training weekend for the Ultimate Dream, and for 2012, in February. Further training events are planned in 2012.

We continue to work at making the most of the Mission opportunities, provided by our location, Sunday Services and open doors. We have continued with a number of regular Mission events and initiatives during the year:

- Prayer Walks have continued, led by Gill and Iris. These provide an opportunity to pray for a small area and invite prayer requests from residents.
- The Healing Cafe continued every Tuesday with Sheva in charge.
- There was a quiz night in the Spring
- The Gazebo team were out in the Churchyard on many Saturdays (see separate report).
- We managed 5 out of 7 Open-air morning Services in the churchyard during July and August, with very good feedback from passers by.

We took full advantage of the Christmas and Easter mission opportunities

- The outdoor Christmas Nativity Scene and Easter Garden, were, again, powerful reminders of the Christian message. Thanks to Chris Aubrey for all his work on these.
- Gill Carter organised the **Flower Cross** at the front of the church for Holy Week and Easter.
- We sent out 3000 Easter cards, incorporating a message and an advert for our Easter services.
- The choir brought some Christmas cheer to Stratford with carol singing in the Shopping centre, our annual Lunchtime carol Service and a host of other special services.
- We continued to deliver Christmas cards to all accessible homes and workplaces.

ST JOHN'S MINI-SHOP

MISSION/CHARITY GIVING

The MGC (Mission Giving Committee) meets to agree recommendations to the PCC for St John's Mission Giving Fund. The fund is made up of 10% of budgeted giving from the congregations. 80% of this is given to organisations as a regular donation, while the remaining 20% is given to emergency appeals, usually through charities. (In addition to this, it is worth noting that St John's gives away the Christmas Collections from its Lunchtime Carol Service, and the Midnight Christmas Communion – this year it was given to the Stratford Nightshelter).

Rafe Smallman convenes MGC. Jean Scott (host!), Garry Walker, Dorothy Hylton, and Dave Richards remained as members of MGC. Ade Awokoya joined the group in 2011.

We gave regular donations to 15 organisations in 2011 and supported 3 appeals with the Emergency money. See below for details. In 2011 we had speakers from 3 organisations that we support. In June, NAPAC spoke about the work they do to our Church on Wednesday group. TFM spoke to the church again as part of the mission week in July, while later in the month the Bishop of Northern Uganda spoke at an evening service, organised in partnership with the Archbishop Janani Luwum Trust.

The committee met 4 times in 2011 to discuss which groups to support, which appeals to receive emergency money, which month to pray for each group and who to invite as guest speakers. We also met once socially.

The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. All Church attendees are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and all members of the Roll are eligible to stand for election to the PCC.

There are 2 church buildings within the parish, St. John's, the Broadway, London E15 1NG and St. James, 98 St. James' Road, London E15 1RN.

Day to day responsibility for the mission, ministry and maintenance of St. James Church is delegated to the St. James Church Committee, which meets regularly and is chaired by the Minister in Charge of St. James'. This Committee reports regularly to the PCC.

The PCC met on 9 occasions during 2011. Meetings were held at St John's Church on Monday evenings during all months except April, August & December. They were held on a Monday evening at the earlier time of 7.30pm to 9.30pm and the Chair had to maintain tight control to ensure we covered what was always a full and busy agenda.

When planning our activities for the year, the incumbent and PCC have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and the specific guidance on charities for the advancement of religion. In particular, we try to enable ordinary people to live out their faith as part of our parish community through:

- Worship and prayer; learning about the Gospel; and developing their knowledge and trust in Jesus.
- Provision of pastoral care for people living in the parish.
- Missionary and outreach work.

In order to discharge their responsibilities the following items were discussed by the PCC:

In 2011, our 'Look Ahead' exercise continued by focusing on Bishop Stephen's question of how we can serve the people we already have contact with in such a way that the Gospel will be intriguing, challenging and appealing. Many ideas were shared and discussed, some of which we hope to introduce in 2012.

Training for the 'Ultimate Goal' mission was again given in February, with an 'Ultimate Dream' mission, taking place between 7th and 10th July. As in past years, we partnered with TFM and with other local churches, working together in the run-up to the real event which will be with us in the not too distant future. One event in the programme was a 'Newham Churches have got talent' which took place in our churchyard on the Saturday afternoon. Various acts auditioned, with the aim of deciding which would be suitable to participate in the 2012 event and it was encouraging to see many varied performances all of which are likely to be included in the programme next year.

We continued to make decisions on the maintenance of the church buildings and what initially seemed like a rather straightforward job involving some leadwork and pointing for St John's, eventually became a more complicated and costly task when it was discovered that the top 6 courses of the lower parapet had to be dismantled and re-built. Some of the glass panels in the windows had to be replaced due to some vandalism at the time of the summer riots which hit the streets of our nation in July & August and St James suffered damage following a fire which was probably started deliberately.

The 'Inspiration' rest and faith space' opened in September along with the rest of the huge Westfield Centre and by year end, volunteers from our various churches were signing up for duties on the welcome team and things were generally working out well

The PCC continued to discuss such issues as the church houses, (one of which was sold during 2011), general finance, child protection and the planning of special services.

To facilitate this work the PCC has responsibility for the maintenance of the fabric St. John's Church, the Broadway, London E15 and St. James Church, St. James' Road, London E15. During 2011 the following building issues were addressed:

At St. John's:

- Emergency Evacuation procedures were reviewed.
- A dead tree was removed
- Repairs were undertaken to the high-level parapets on the north side
- Repairs to the organ were undertaken
- Some broken window panes were replaced

At St. James':

- Folding chairs were purchased to supplement the 70 upholstered chairs
- The vestry and store were renovated and rearranged at the same time as work under insurance necessary to deal with external fire damage to that part of the church

In addition to the St. James Committee, the PCC also has the following committees, which meet and report, as necessary, to full PCC meetings.

- ♦ **Standing Committee** for the whole PCC, which transacts emergency business between PCC meetings and occasionally meets to consider business referred to it by PCC.
- Parish Housing Committee for the whole PCC, which manages the assistant clergy houses owned by the PCC.
- ♦ **Building Committee** for St. John's, which is responsible for the maintenance of St. John's church building.
- Personnel Committee for St. John's, which oversees lay workers, both voluntary and paid, at St. John's
- Mission and Charity Giving Committee for St. John's, which is responsible for giving away 10% of St. John's collections to missions and charities.

CHURCH ATTENDANCE

The PCC are keen to offer a range of services during the week and over the course of the year that our community find both beneficial and spiritually fulfilling. All are welcome to attend our regular services.

- On the day of the 2011 Annual Meeting the Parish Electoral Roll numbered 353 (St. John's: 282, St. James': 71)
- During 2011, average Sunday attendances at St. John's were 342 morning and 68 evening.
- During 2011, average Sunday attendances at St. James' were 45 morning, 11 afternoon and 13 evening.

In addition to our regular services, we enable our community to celebrate and thank God at the milestones of the journey through life. Through baptism we thank God for the gift of life, in marriage public vows are exchanged with God's blessing and through funeral services friends and family express their grief and give thanks for the life which is now complete in this world and to commend the person into God's keeping.

We want our churches to be open to our community for private prayer, and this is achieved at St. John's through the employment of paid staff and the time generously given by our unpaid receptionists.

Both churches benefit the wider community as places for community meetings and activities and through our work of welcoming local schools for educational visits.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

During 2011, PCC income from direct giving exceeded budget. Deanery Share payments to the Diocese were met in full by St. John's and St. James'. The Deanery Share payment is assessed by Newham Deanery, according to an agreed formula. Actual figures showed an increase over 2010 and will continue to increase for some years because of increased congregations at both churches. This payment goes towards the cost of clergy stipends throughout the Diocese of Chelmsford

The freehold house at 2 St. James' Road was sold, the PCC considering that it would not be required for clergy housing in the near future. Part of the proceeds were used to clear the shared-equity mortgage on 29 Maryland Park, now owned freehold.

Both churches are committed to giving away 10% of budgeted annual Giving income to missions and charities identified as organisations we aim to support.

During 2011 St John's gave away a total of £11,144.08 to 23 organisations

• £9,750 was assigned to the Charities Fund, and donated to 19 organisations in line with our Mission and Charity donations policy. The remainder comprised money from special projects or collections for specific purposes.

More details of Mission and Charity Giving are included in the St. John's Annual Review.

During 2011 St. James donated a total of £1,047 to 6 organisations.

The net result for the year, in general funds, was a year on year deficit of £16833.78 for St. John's, mainly due to withdrawals from reserves to fund the cost of the essential work undertaken to repair high-level parapet walls. There was a deficit of £1645 for St. James, partly due to a priority through the year for increasing support to the Fabric Fund in view of work planned for 2012. Transfers of funds are shown in the full accounts.

RESERVES POLICY:

St. John's policy is to maintain a balance on unrestricted funds, (if possible), which equates to approximately six months unrestricted payments. This policy is based on the following factors:

- Church membership is constantly changing within a community with a very transient population. Members' giving is therefore subject to fluctuation.
- Rents received for use of space in St John's church building are also subject to fluctuation because
 most users are community groups or Local Government departments, and are dependent on funding
 decisions for continued bookings
- St. John's has significant liabilities for staff salaries, and the possibility of heavy repair bills to the building in the future.

The balance in the general fund at the year-end was £19539.76 which is considerably below this target. In 2011 PCC took the strategic decision to use some of the accumulated reserves to undertake urgent repair work, to the parapets. The lowered balance reflects this decision. The PCC aims to restore the balance to our target level over the coming years.

St. John's also has a designated Capital Asset Fund to meet some expected costs for fabric and equipment replacement. At the year-end this stood at £43,512.79

St. James' policy is to maintain a balance on general funds (if possible), which equates to approximately six months general payments. This policy is based on the following factors:

- Church membership is constantly changing within a community with a very transient population. Members' giving is therefore subject to fluctuation.
- St. James has fewer regular bookings, which are also subject to change.
- St. James building is liable to require expensive repairs in the future.

The balance in the general fund at the year-end was £4393.33, which represented just under 60% of this target figure: once current improvement work to the fabric is completed it is intended to start rebuilding the general fund balance.

More detailed financial information may be obtained from the annual accounts, available from the Church Office.

REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE NEWHAM DEANERY SYNOD

The Deanery Synod brings together the Anglican clergy of Newham and elected lay representatives of their churches. Lay representatives are elected to the Deanery Synod for three year terms, and since the 2011 annual meeting those elected for St John's are Chris Aubrey, John Burman and Carol Richards. From St James there are Janet Williams, and John Meadway, who is Deanery Treasurer. Under church law Deanery Synod may consider and express opinions on matters referred to it by the General or Diocesan Synod, and consider resolutions passed to it by PCCs to go on to higher levels. Its lay members are in their personal capacities the electors to the Diocesan and General Synods. Typically it has evening meetings four times a year at churches around Newham, with attendances of 30-40. These are reported regularly to PCC meetings.

The first two meetings in 2011 had a diocesan focus. In January there was a discussion of the proposed legislation on Women Bishops which was to go to the Diocesan Synod later in the year, and this was endorsed by the meeting. In March 2011 the meeting was part of Bishop Stephen's inaugural visit to the Newham Deanery. In June Rev James Ramsay led a session on Creative Prayer, and the last meeting of the year in October was on African Christian Spirituality, led by Rev Chigor Chike and Rev Frances Quist.

An important activity of the Deanery Synod each year is to decide the size of each parish's share of Newham Deanery's part of the overall diocesan family purse bill (the Deanery Share). A large proportion of the family purse pays for clergy stipends, pensions and housing, and it also funds most of the rest of the diocese's expenditure. The Deanery Share currently shows larger increases then elsewhere in the diocese as the number of clergy in Newham has not fallen in the way it has in many other parts of the diocese.

The overall pattern of the allocation to parishes, the parish shares, does not change much from year to year, as the Deanery attaches importance to having as much stability as possible in the financial environment for parishes. It continues to allocate the family purse bill in proportion to size of congregation, as far as possible, and this was the core policy for the 2012 allocations, again with a phasing-in to avoid excessive increases for those churches that have shown relatively large growth in their numbers. The limit on the increase (over and above the increase in the Deanery share) was 3% for 2012, a feature of importance to St John's and St James's. Even so, there remains for the future a substantial problem in the allocation within Newham Deanery, arising from the impact of big increases in numbers at the rapidly growing parishes over recent years.
